September - October (Dates TBD)

Help the Friends collect prairie plant seeds at Pope Farm Conservancy. The collected seed will help to increase the diversity of prairie plant species at PFC and to improve the overall quality of the prairies.

Property & Operations Update

If you've visited the Conservancy this spring you may have noticed a few areas looking a bit forlorn. Chalk up this wear and tear to increased foot traffic. But things are looking up, thanks to efforts of the Town of Middleton and Pope Farms Friend, Jim Bolitho. The Conservancy is looking pretty spiffy these days with fresh mulch, the return of the interpretive signage, and the in-need areas on the trails have been carefully staked out for reseeding. Friend Bob Wink even gave the pamphlet holders a new coat of paint. Kudos and cheers to the Town and Friends for making the Conservancy shine!

Do you know what gas, chicken wings, lumber, cars, chlorine, and ketchup have in common? Yep, they are all in short supply these days. A weird combination of factors including the pandemic (of course), severe winter storms and a hacking incident are to blame and even the Conservancy has been impacted.

If you've noticed fewer bluebirds and tree swallows on your hikes, you aren't imagining things. The big storm that hit Texas in February that knocked out the power grid as well as a late ice and snowstorm in southern Illinois have seriously affected some bird populations here in the Midwest. In fact, these storms may have hurt some bird populations by as much as 50%. Finding food this year has been problematic and a few spring cold snaps have taken their toll. As a result, there have been some causalities within the Conservancy. So, this year especially, celebrate the birds you see and welcome them back!

Pope Farm Elementary School's Farm Day

On Tuesday, June 1st, K-4th grade students from Pope Farm Elementary School celebrated 'Farm Day' by participating in activities at Pope Farm Conservancy, Forward Garden and on site at Pope Farm Elementary. There was even a farm animal zoo (provided by Lucky Dog Farm, Hillenmeyer Farm and Willow Ridge Homestead) with goats, sheep, peacocks, ducks and chickens.

Education Team Update

Members of the FOPCF Education Team will be meeting with staff from Pope Farm Elementary School in early June to discuss how to revamp some of the existing lesson plans pertaining to features of the Conservancy as well as creative, practical ways to incorporate the Conservancy into the curriculum. Although the Elementary school was physically completed last July, the past school year has been anything but typical. So, the specific interface between the Friends group and the school is definitely a work in progress as the entire MCP school district regroups from the disruption of the pandemic. Stay tuned.

In the meantime, the show must go on! Two new videos are in the works related to the existing German Immigration Tour. One pertains to a new segment on schools and how they once functioned. The other features the cabin site first unearthed at the Conservancy in 2008. Once these videos are completed the current signage on the property will be updated to reflect the new material.

The History of the Land video production is also in progress. Several scripts have been prepared to accompany the photos and graphics featured as part of the videos, each of them weaving in the stories of those who settled and cared for the land that is now Pope Farm Conservancy. The video topics include:

- Pioneer Farmers
- Clearing the Land and Building the Stone Fence (Complete)
- How the Land was Used over Time (Complete)
- Modern Era; Living on the Farm
- The Pope Family (Complete)
- How the Pope Farm became a Conservancy (Complete)

The Geology Interactive Tour Video Project is in progress as well. We hope to complete the content on 6 different stories on Geology by the end of the summer.

The Self-Guided Tour Pamphlets available at the entrance of the Conservancy and the upper parking area will be restocked. They had been previously removed with the onset of covid last year.
