Recap of August Programs

Prairie Tour & Workshop - August 14th

"Wildflowers in the Conservancy" with Wild Ones Madison



Over 50 people flocked to Pope Farm on a beautiful morning in mid-August to learn more about these plants. The program was led by prairie restoration specialist Jeff Steele of the Madison chapter of Wild Ones, assisted by Laurie Yahr and Athena Salzer.

The leaders pointed out numerous varieties of prairie flowers at the conservancy --including gentian, baptisia, oxeye sunflower, wild quinine, golden alexander, cardinal flower, nodding onion, monarda and many more. They also gave interesting background information, such as why golden rod can so easily

take over a field (it releases a chemical that prevents other plants from taking hold around it), whether to plant wet soil with purple gentian or yellow (the answer is purple), how boneset got its name (because it was thought to help bone repair), how to recognize a cupflower (its leaves are shaped like cups), and why burning is necessary (among other things, it keeps trees out of a flower field).

Before the tour they introduced the group to guidebooks on wildflowers and provided information about other wildflower resources such as their own. (Wild Ones is a statewide organization promoting environmentally sound landscaping practices to preserve biodiversity through native plants.)

This is the second program Wild Ones has offered at Pope Farm. We look forward to having them return. If you have a program suggestion on wildflowers, please share your idea with the FOPFC Program Committee.

The Schools



This 5-minute video shows the public-school experience of the children in the Town of Middleton during the 1800s. It features what a school day was like at the one room schools that dotted the Township. The children who once lived on the land that today is the Conservancy went to the Pleasant Site School on Old Sauk Rd (pictured below). The building was built in 1868, and has been modified, but still stands today.
