In 2021, Forward Garden contributed more than 28,000 pounds of produce to the Madison area emergency food system. Thanks to increased involvement from community members, local area groups and business work teams, the garden was able to grow and harvest 54 different crops across 4 acres last year.

This is the newest school in the Middleton-Cross Plains Area School District and serves Kindergarten through fourth grade. The school officially opened in Fall 2020, then welcomed its first students for in-person learning in February 2021. The tour will be led by Principal Jessica Taylor and Science Specialist Teacher Alex Schutz.

You will be delighted by the unique and beautiful interior design. Each grade level has its own designated icon and color scheme. "The graphics on the walls bring in natural elements from the surrounding Pope Farm Conservancy to create a visual identity for the architectural and interior design theme," says designer Lauren McClone.

In addition to the tour, Alex Schutz will talk about how he uses Pope Farm Conservancy to teach elementary schoolaged students about earth science, geology, botany, biology, conservation, ecology, and more!

### Friends to Propose New Signage to Help Protect the Blackhawk Prairie

The Blackhawk prairie has had increasing damage each fall due to visitors walking out into the prairie for photo shoots. This results in large areas of trampled grasses in the Blackhawk prairie which is causing damage to the vegetation and disrupting the nesting activities for the birds.

The Friends group is offering to pay for and install 4 signs at the Blackhawk Prairie that will read "NESTING AREAS - KEEP ON MOWED TRAILS."

This offer will be presented to the Town of Middleton. We sincerely hope that the signage will create an awareness that shooting photos of these beautiful natural areas is wonderful, but we need to respect the vegetation and the wildlife that create that beauty.

# **FOPFC to Participate in Pope Farm Elementary School Farm Day**

In May 2022, all Pope Farm Elementary students will participate in the school's annual "Farm Day" event, which will take place at Pope Farm Conservancy, Forward Garden, and on site at Pope Farm Elementary. Classes will rotate to different stations throughout the day, learning about all aspects of agriculture and farming, from growing food to raising animals. Last year, students got to plant pumpkins at Forward Garden, hike the conservancy, participate in farm-themed relay races, read to farm animals, and do some arts and crafts inside the school.

#### A New Start for a 1000-Year Garden



Visitors to Pope Farm might have noticed a few new things at the 1000-Year Garden at Pope Farm last summer—taller and lusher corn, perches for the pair of red-tailed hawks that kept it rodent-free, different varieties of squash, and so on. The most exciting 'new' thing about the 2021 garden, however, was something familiar to long-time visitors. The 1000-Year Garden was the first of the two Heritage gardens established at Pope Farm. It showcases the crops and field technologies used by Native American populations in Wisconsin 1000 years ago. From the very beginning, the garden was meant to be a teaching tool for 4th-grade teachers. Each spring, visiting students planted corn, sunflowers, and squash in the garden; and every fall, students came to learn about how the garden's bounty would have been preserved through the winter.

Changes in how the Middleton/Cross Plains school district interacted with Pope Farm eventually led to the end of student involvement in the garden. Volunteers with the Friends Group stepped in to take their place. Happily, with the opening of Pope Farm Elementary, the garden has returned to its roots. In 2021, 4th graders once again entered the garden. They planted sunflowers, squash, and corn.

The 2021 class planted each of the three ridges in the small, ridged field in the garden with a different mix of corn. One ridge was planted with 'Pope Farm Purple', a variety developed over the last 10 years by carefully selecting seed corn over multiple generations, choosing only the most purple ears. Another was planted with a variety called 'Glass Gem', which has translucent, pastel kernels and tall, vigorous stalks. The third ridge was planted with a mix of the two.

As the garden grew, the differences in each ridge became apparent, and the resulting crop contained ears mixing the best of both breeds.

This new experiment will continue in 2022, as students return once again to get their hands dirty. Perhaps when they are grown, they will bring their own children to the gardens to proudly point at the Pope Farm Gem corn they had a hand in creating.

# **Volunteer Spotlight: Robby Sonzogni**

This month, we would like to recognize one of our Program Committee members and long-time

volunteer: Robby Sonzogni.

Robby and her family have lived near what is now Pope Farm Conservancy since the early 1980s. They have watched it develop over the years, walking the area before it was officially the conservancy. When Pope Farm became a park/conservancy, Robby and her husband, Bill, joined the focus sessions regarding what uses people wanted to see on the land.

Robby now visits the conservancy about once a week and occasionally shares photos of neat things she sees on her hikes. She enjoys watching the changing of the seasons, the birds and prairies, and the serenity. In winter, she heads out to the conservancy to snowshoe or cross-country ski. "I love the peaceful beauty!" she remarks. In March, when she sees the first



bluebirds at PFC, she knows that spring is coming! "This year that was March 21st," she says.

Robby joined the Friends group in 2013 and first started volunteering during Sunflower Days. She continues to be a member of the Program Committee which plans public talks and tours at the conservancy throughout the year. During the winter season, Robby volunteers to lead the Winter Walks at PFC, as well.

When asked about her favorite memory at Pope Farm Conservancy, she replied, "My favorite memory was having our 50th anniversary family photos taken using the last Sunflowers as a backdrop. The setting was spectacular at the top of the hill."

We are so grateful for Robby's contributions to the Friends group and the Program Committee. Thank you, Robby, for your hard work in planning and participating in events at the conservancy. You have truly made a difference at Pope Farm!


#### **Hike the Bluebird Trail**
