> Virtual Presentation: "History of the Civilian Conservation Corp at Pope Farm"

Wednesday, January 26th, 2022, at 7:00 p.m.

Guest speakers: Bob Moore and Jim Bolitho

Join us on Zoom for a virtual presentation about past and present infrastructure projects at Pope Farm Conservancy. Historian Bob Moore will be joining us to talk about the Civilian Conservation Corp (CCC) soil erosion dam site that was built on the Pope Farm property in the 1930s. We'll learn about the men and boys (pictured right) who were housed at the CCC camp in Mt. Horeb. Bob will also talk about the importance of the CCC, especially in terms of its immediate impact to this



area during the Depression years. We invite you to watch our 6-part video series on the legacy of the CCC at Pope Farm prior to Bob's talk.

Later on, we'll hear more about the Erosion Mitigation Project at the Ravine in the fall of 2021. Jim Bolitho will be available to answer questions about the changed topography and a relocated trail on the east side of the ravine.

Students Learn about German Immigration at PFC

Fourth graders from the Pope Farm Elementary spent two hours at the Conservancy on a cold November 3rd morning, learning at three different stations. A Friends member presented a session on German immigration at the Goth cabin site. The PFE teachers presented two other activities: one was playing games that children would have played in the 1860s, and the other dealt with American Indian groups moving through their area gathering resources available in nature and trading with other groups if they



believed they did not have enough resources to last through the winter.

Meet Our Newest Trail Stewards: Dick and Mary Weeks

Please join us in welcoming the newest members of our Trail Steward Program: Dick and Mary Weeks. The Trail Stewards serve as additional "eyes" to oversee the conservancy and help protect the scenic landscapes and tranquility of PFC for the enjoyment of the public. While walking the trails, they look out for things that may be safety issues, such as fallen tree branches, footing obstacles (recently many big holes) in the paths, etc. They also report maintenance issues, like high weeds in the walkways or amphitheaters, damage to fences, trees/shrubs in need of pruning, vandalism, overflowing garbage, and things like that.



Dick and Mary (pictured right) visit Pope Farm Conservancy once a week now that they are retired. They enjoy watching where new birds show up, what prairie flowers are blooming, and which trees are getting colorful. "Each season has something very nice to observe," says Dick. "We love the hills, the views, and glimpses of Lake Mendota and the Capitol." Some of their favorite things to see at Pope Farm are the Sandhill cranes and butterflies.

When asked what inspired them to volunteer as trail stewards, they replied, "We have time on our hands and volunteering is a good cause. We like to be outside so why not pay attention in the environment and address things in need of attention?" The Weeks are also stewards at the UW Arboretum. They feel it's important to be concerned about our world, our environment, and what can we do to make a difference. "Pope Farm Conservancy is a treasure to us. We are lucky to live nearby," they add.

From Our Partners at Forward Garden

Forward Garden Ends Successful Season

We have reached the end of our second successful growing season at Forward Garden thanks to increased involvement from community members, local area groups and business work teams. Total acreage in production increased from 2.6 acres planted in 2020 to about 4 acres this year, which allowed us to contribute more than 28,000 pounds of produce from 54 different crops to the local emergency food system.

This included approximately:

- 1,100 pounds of tomatillos
- 1,800 pounds of butternut squash
- 2,100 pounds of sweet corn
- 2,600 pounds of melon and watermelon
- 5,400 pounds of peppers
- 3,800 pounds of tomatoes

Forward Garden also featured a very friendly flock of laying hens this season as well as a pumpkin patch that students from Pope Farm Elementary School planted during a field trip in June. The pumpkins were provided to the school for their first annual Trunk-or-Treat fundraiser in October.

We look forward to seeing what new community engagement opportunities present themselves in 2022!



Winter at the Conservancy

Hours, Activities, and Reminders

Pope Farm Conservancy is open year-round from sunrise to sunset. It's a great place for trekking through snow, winter birding, and even photography. You can also enjoy a variety of winter activities, such as snowshoeing, sledding, crosscountry skiing, and hiking. Come enjoy the stark beauty of winter at PFC!

REMINDERS: Please stay on the designated trails and do not venture out into the prairies or crop fields. The lower parking lot off Old Sauk Road will remain open and plowed through the winter months. All other parking lots will be closed. Thank you for your cooperation.

RAVINE TRAIL UPDATE: The trail near the ravine at Pope Farm Conservancy will remain closed through the



winter months due to the recent planting of vegetation as part of the repairs made to the ravine, to preserve the integrity of the matting. Although the ground is frozen in the wintertime, foot traffic, skiers and their poles will destroy the matting before the vegetation is established next spring. Your understanding is appreciated.

Winter Bird Watch: American Tree Sparrows

Just because the wintery weather has moved into southern Wisconsin doesn't mean all the interesting songbirds are gone. There is a durable migratory sparrow that will spend the winter months at our fields, prairies, and backyard feeders. By now, the American Tree Sparrows have already arrived at Pope Farm Conservancy from the northernmost regions of Canada.

Pope Farm Conservancy's prairies offer these sparrows exactly the type of habitat they need to survive our harsh winters. They can be found in



medium-sized to large flocks feeding on the weeds and prairie plant seeds, especially goldenrod. They eat snow to obtain water, and they can endure our coldest winters, even when it's twenty below zero! About the only thing they have to be concerned about is being captured and eaten by small hawks.

American Tree Sparrows are an abundant species, but they're easily missed. If you snowshoe or hike the conservancy's trails this winter, be sure to listen for this sparrow's "teedle-eet teedle-eet" bird call.

A few other bird species to keep an eye out for this winter are Northern Cardinals, Black-capped Chickadees, Dark-eyed Juncos, woodpeckers, nuthatches, hawks, and even owls. Happy birding!
