Upcoming Programs

Nest Box Trail Walk at Pope Farm Conservancy

Saturday, May 13th, 2023 at 2PM

Have you ever wondered.... Why is there a nest box trail at Pope Farm? How often are the boxes monitored? When and why are the boxes cleaned out? What species cause problems for the native cavity nesters? Join us on Saturday, May 13th at 2PM to find out the answers! Trail monitors Pat Ready and Curt Caslavka will be at Pope Farm Conservancy to lead us on a walk and share their knowledge about nest box trails placed around the



conservancy. Learn first-hand what species use nest boxes and the type of habitat they need. Nest box type, poles, and predator guards will be explained, as well.

Recap of March Programs

Raptor Talk with Madison Audubon - March 14th

On Tuesday, March 14th, the Friends of Pope Farm Conservancy invited members of the Madison Audubon Society to present on the Audubon's involvement in raptor research and citizen science projects in Wisconsin. The presentation took place at Pope Farm Elementary School, and we had about 25 people attending in person and 55 people viewing the live stream online via Zoom. The presenters included Mark Martin, Drew Cashman, Graham Steinauer, Emma Raasch, and Pat Ready.

Diane Smidt from the FOPFC Programs Committee started the evening with a nice introduction highlighting Mark Martin and Sue Foote-Martin's involvement with conservation groups in Wisconsin and long-time careers with the Wisconsin DNR. Both Mark and Sue will be inducted into the Wisconsin Conservation Hall of Fame in April 2023!

Mark Martin then gave a quick overview of Madison Audubon's raptor research and conservation efforts. He explained that the transmitters they use to track certain species of birds contain a solar panel, a battery, a GPS system, and a cell phone. Some transmitters can even take the bird's temperature and record elevation and flying speed!

The first presenter of the night was Drew Cashman who helped to grow a Bald Eagle Nest Watch Program in Wisconsin with Madison Audubon and several other organizations around the state. The program is now in its 6th season and has grown to monitor 170 nests with 456 volunteers in 36 counties of Wisconsin. The data collected by these volunteers is critical now that the DNR no longer has the resources to monitor these nests.



The next presenter was Graham Steinauer who introduced us to the Red-shouldered Hawk and the Northern Harrier. Graham talked about the birds' identification, habitat, diet, nesting and breeding, migration, and population status. He then explained how the red-shouldered hawks are banded (pictured right) and how the transmitters are attached to the adult birds.

Our third speaker, Emma Raasch, spoke about the Rough-legged Hawk Project in Wisconsin. Emma explained how these hawks are trapped using a Bal-Chatri trap, what data is collected about each bird, and



how the transmitters they attach to these hawks capture important migration data. One hawk they named Dorothy logged a whopping 1,175 miles roundtrip from Goose Pond Sanctuary to her summer home in northern Quebec.

Our next speaker was Pat Ready who talked about monitoring American Kestrel boxes. Pat shared information about the kestrels' life cycle and biology and their ability to hover while hunting prey. It's

unclear why the kestrel population has been declining in Wisconsin over the past 10 years but Pat says putting out nest boxes is one way to help the kestrel numbers. He then explained how he installs and monitors kestrel nest boxes across southern Wisconsin.

Our final speaker of the night was Mark Martin who talked about Project SNOWstorm and the tracking of snowy owls across Wisconsin. The transmitters attached to the owls track the birds' movement every hour and report data back three times a week. Finally, Mark talked about the Red-tailed Hawk Project, which is a long-term study about the 14



subspecies of red-tailed hawks. The goal is to learn about the genetics of these different subspecies and why some species migrate, and others don't.
